He was also a member of the Denver Highlanders Rugby team where he loved playing as the 8th man and traveling all over the world to compete. Terry was a pilot for United Airlines for over 30 years. He loved flying the friendly skies and seeing the world. Terry was a loving father and husband and forever proud of his 5 children and 5 grandchildren. He was a huge sports enthusiast and an amazing basketball coach to his children.
